

Msgr. Robert Roh celebrated the 50th Anniversary of his Ordination to the Priesthood this summer and is officially retired after serving 27 years as Superintendent of Falls City Sacred Heart School and Senior Pastor at Sts. Peter & Paul Catholic Church. FCSH will dedicate the new Activity Center, which will open for the upcoming school year, in his honor at a ceremony the night before the first day of the 2015-16 school year.

Falls City Sacred Heart School will officially dedicate the Roh Activity Center at a 6 p.m. ceremony on the eve of the first day of the 2015-16 school year Wednesday, Aug. 12, on the school campus.

The Most Rev. James D. Conley, Bishop of the Lincoln Diocese, will be on hand to participate in the short program. The Sacred Heart Home & School Association will host an all-school (preschool-12th) open house in conjunction with the dedication.

Fifty years after his ordination and more than a quarter of a century serving as Senior Pastor at Sts. Peter & Paul and Superintendent of FC Sacred Heart School, Msgr. Roh officially retired this summer, and his former pupil, Fr. Thomas Dunavan, has taken over his duties. Msgr. Roh plans to remain in Falls City and continue working at the church and school in one capacity or another.

"A priest gets attached," he once said.

"We have great people here," Msgr. Roh said in a June interview. "This has been an amazing assignment for me. Its all truly been a gift."

Msgr. Roh arrival in Falls City from David City on June 10, 1988 and officiated over 106 marriages, 473 Baptisms and 435 funerals, taught hundreds of students and molded countless boys and girls into the best hurdlers and pole vaulters in Nebraska

The Abie, NE, native was ordained on July 11, 1965, after just three years of study at Rome, at the Church of the Twelve Apostles, and spent the fourth year earning the equivalent of a Master's degree, which licensed him to teach theology. He celebrated his first Mass in 1966 at his home parish, Sts. Peter and Paul Catholic Church in Abie.

The kick-off to the Activities Center fund raising campaign began in

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
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Walk, Don't Run

Last week started like any other work week for me. I was a little stiff which I attributed to being a slug on the couch all weekend and tired, which has become my new normal over the last year. I noticed as the week went on my arms got a bit weaker and I was having constant hot flashes. I don't feel like I have really been 'healthy' for years. There is always something wrong and it's usually nothing a little aspirin or sleep can't fix. I shrugged it off as a migraine accompanied with some gas trapped in my chest.

Then came Wednesday morning. I woke up around 3 a.m. in pain. My neck was stiff and my chest hurt on my left side. Again chalked it up to gas and tried to go back to sleep. At 5:00 a.m. I decided to get out of bed and sit on the porch with a cup of coffee. I was feeling worse by the second but got dressed to go to work and continued my normal routine.

At work I kept going downhill. I ran to the store and grabbed some gas medicine and Tylenol. My head was starting to hurt and breathing was becoming more difficult with every passing minute. After lunch I couldn't take it anymore, I had to go home and lay down. I couldn't breathe normally and it was getting difficult to even hold my head up. I was weak as I got in my car to head home. The tears welled up in my eyes as I pulled out of the parking lot and headed north up Harlan Street. From the moment I walked in the door of my house, my condition worsened.

Most of that night is a blur for me. I was taking Aspirin by the handful and trying to relax and sleep. The problem with sleeping was that I couldn't lie down. The moment I tried, I couldn't breathe. Brian was worried but I smiled, told him I was fine and I would sleep downstairs so I wouldn't bother him. "It's definitely gas," I told him over and over even though I knew it was more than gas at this point.

Then began the longest night of my life. I was tired and delirious as I paced around the living room all night long in the dark. I was in too much pain to focus on the television so my mind kept me company as time seemed to nearly stand still. Sometimes standing felt best, sometimes sitting felt best. Either way I could only do one or the other for about 10 minutes at a time before the pain engulfed me yet again.

Around 3 a.m. I realized that it was entirely possible that I was having a heart attack. I smoke, I eat poorly and I'm always stressed. I started scanning the room to see what could be sold to afford the health care I would need if I was indeed having a heart attack. The TV would only bring enough for maybe an x-ray or two. The car could probably get me a few days in the hospital, the dining room table could pay for my oxygen and so on. This cataloging of our possessions went on for hours. I wondered if we would be able to sell our house to cover some of the cost. My mind was now my worst enemy but it was the only thing I could do to keep it together. At this point I was fully convinced that I was in the middle of a heart attack. Instead of calling 9-1-1, I thought about money. We couldn't afford for me to call an ambulance, have all the tests and be flown out if I needed to be. How many people ignore their health every single day? How many people refuse treatments for cancer because they don't have insurance and don't want to leave their family in debt? Too damn many!

I consider myself to be a logical person with a good head on my shoulders, but why would I sit in excruciating pain for hours on end instead of going into the emergency room? Because there was just no way we could afford it. We don't have health insurance. I wasn't going to risk thousands of dollars for something that could have possibly been gas. This is the world we live in now. In my mind I'm only going to the emergency room if I am bleeding to death and even then I would probably see if it could wait until regular office hours.


Thursday morning after having no sleep for the past 29 hours, I slowly drove to the hospital. I was tired, light headed and struggling to breathe. Each breath felt like a knife to the left side of my body. The pain and struggle was evident to everyone who saw me that morning. My bonus mom, Rhonda, was working and stopped in to see how I was feeling. I broke down, hugged her and cried. I was scared and tired and just needed to see one familiar face at that moment. Everyone who worked to squeeze me in that morning realized how much pain I was in. I could only speak about four words before stopping to gasp for air. Everyone was concerned and I could see it on their face. Anytime anyone acknowledged how awful I looked or how much pain I was in, I cried.

After two chest X-rays and a blood test it was determined that I had pneumonia. I was shocked to say the least. Sure I have felt run down, warm and achy but not sick. I haven't been coughing or stuffed up at all. I was so incredibly relieved that it wasn't the heart attack I knew it would be. I walked out of the hospital thrilled and thankful that it was only pneumonia, something that can be cured, but I was tired and still in a tremendous amount of pain.

I barely made it home before I started to cry yet again. Crying was next to impossible, I gasped for air and begged God to let Brian make it home as soon as possible to help me. Brian did walk in the door a short time later and spent his day taking care of me. The next few hours were some of the worst I'd ever had. The chest pain was intense, the nausea from lack of sleep was high and everything on my body hurt. I slept in spurts while sitting up until the pain became too much in that position. This went on until about 9 p.m., when my medication started to kick in and I was able to lean over to sleep. Then angels sang, babies laughed and a rainbow appeared. It was that glorious.

Today I still hurt, I'm worn down and not at all myself. This was a huge learning experience for me and I want to share it with some of you - who maybe think like me. Don't risk your health. What I did was so incredibly dumb! I knew I was sick and it was really bad and I did nothing because I was too scared. I was scared we would go into debt. I risked my health because of money. I could have put my son and husband in a position where I was no longer in their lives because we can't afford an illness or disability.

Things need to change. I don't know how but there needs to come a day really soon where I don't have to choose between having health insurance or having groceries, a car and electricity. What I did was dumb and I made myself worse by not seeking treatment the moment I felt ill. I will end up spending more because I waited. Don't be like me, don't ignore your health for any reason whatsoever. I learned my lesson the difficult way. Thank God I am here to be taught this lesson, the outcome could have been so much worse and for so many others it will be.



Independent third party should assess DOC culture, not governor

Changing the culture of the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services is a necessary and daunting task that could take sometime.

I applaud new director Scott Frakes for initiating the process by scheduling a survey of random employees while promising anonymity. Let's hope that works. Let's hope even more that the attitude change starts from the top down.

Frakes has characterized the situation as a culture of fear. The stories we get are of guards "forced" to work overtime for fear of retribution. Their higher-ups say the overtime is necessary because the 13 institutions in the system are short-staffed. They are short-staffed because people hear the stories about staffing and overtime.

Prisons, not unlike the police agencies that are responsible for rounding up the very folks who often wind up on the other side of the bars, are para-military organizations. Guards answer to sergeants who answer to lieutenants who answer to captains who answer to wardens who answer to the director who answers to the governor.

There's nothing fundamentally wrong with that structure except that it tends to promote a culture of fear. Written or not, each level has its quota system and the people working at each level know what they have to do to succeed, or advance in the organization. The same is true - to an extent - in other government agencies and the corporate world. Who among us hasn't had a fearful moment in our working life.

But, it's a different problem in corrections where the product is not merchandise or sales or service. The product is people - people who have been stripped of their freedoms and are at the mercy of the system and the people who run it. The guards and officers have to have a certain amount of apprehension hanging out every day with some of society's worst. No doubt that leads to some attitude problems on both sides of the bars.

Kudos to Frakes for wanting to understand the staff. He knows the system because he worked his way up the ladder in the Washington state prison system. Surely he remembers his days as a guard and an officer on his way to the top. He should have some idea of how the people he wants to interview think and react.

Governor Pete Ricketts' chief human resources officer will lead the study. Frakes says about 300 randomly selected staff will be interviewed. I'd be more comfortable if an independent person or group was leading the way. Remember how you felt when you got called to the principal's office where good things rarely happened? And to whom does the human resources officer answer?

For that matter, to whom does the governor answer? The people? And how do the people have any say beyond the ballot box? The Legislature? Well, we all saw how well that worked out during the governor's first session with the 49 who were elected to represent the views of Nebraskans.

Frakes says the Department of Health and Human Services will design the interview and staff from the departments of revenue and labor, administrative services and the Ne-

braska State Patrol will do the interviews. No one from the Corrections Department will interview staff.

That's a good start, but these are all folks who answer to folks who ultimately answer to the governor. What's to say that the culture of fear doesn't exist in this situation as well? Who will do the analysis of the collected data? Who will interpret it?

How about the inmates, the people on the other side of the bars who are also affected by this culture of fear. Where is their voice? Wasn't that lack of being heard one of the things that caused the recent riot at Tecumseh that left

two inmates dead and hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage?

Would it be that difficult to interview 300 inmates? Would it be out of line to have the information analyzed by independent psychologists and sociologists?

Will the information be released in a written report presented to the media by the governor and the director? Or will it be explained in a series of statewide town hall meetings with the families of inmates and prison workers invited to participate in question and answer sessions.

It's a great idea to try to change the culture, Mr. Director. But don't do a superficial job and tell the rest of us it feels better. Show us something.

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Just for fun are you ready to check your memory bank? I'm going to name all of the cafes/restaurants I can remember, starting out with the two oldest.

One Stop Café, 21st and Stone Street. It got its start in the mid-1920s when Glenn D. Martin of Martin Oil Co. built the gas station and lunchroom. Highway 73 came in on West 21st Street in those days and turned at 21st and Stone to run through the business district. The first café managers I can remember are Barney and Ethel Barnes because I was a carhop for them. Others running the café through the years were Pete and Zella Schawang, Bob Prater and John Huber, Ace Gingrich. The current owner/manager is Alice Bentley, who bought it from Mark Bentley in 1994.

Breezy Hill Café. My memory goes back to the mid-1930s when it was a small building with Porgy Jones selling wonderful pork sandwiches with the best barbecue sauce ever for 25 cents. Next I recall was Bryan "Beany" Prater. Nicknames were cruel in those days and his nickname came from the shape of his head. He went by Beany and he ran an excellent restaurant with no alcohol and no monkeyshines. Disaster struck in World War II, both sons being killed in the war He was followed by Bob and Burdeen Prater who really knew how to run a restaurant and did so for many years. Other operators took over through the years and the current very successful operator Greg Strickland.

Sid Brown's Café was about where Jenkins Financial Services is located at 1616 Stone. A roast beef sandwich with spuds and gravy was 35 cents and Sid did a good business especially on Saturday nights when there might be a midnight altercation or two on the sidewalk out front. John Huber later took it over.

Carter's Café, next to the alley on the northwest side of what is Sapp Brothers. Francis and Irene Carter were the owners. They served, along with conversation, good bean soup. They later managed the Country Club eatery where Francis became an institution.

Susie Mason's Hi-Way Café, just out of town on East 14th Street. Susie's specialty was Missouri River carp and catfish caught by her son Jim and other Rulo fishermen.

And then there's the Candlelight Cabin in low light and Sally Stanton creating delicious salads, sandwiches, and deserts. If you went to Larry Larimore's place south of town you could eat barbecued ribs and be very pleased with them. At Chat n'Nibble, Danny Bacakos could slice been for a sandwich so thin you could read the paper through it. But tasty.

Crosstown Café, now the location of Jack Chittick's New York Lfe Insurance. The operator I recall is Don Baker. It was the bus stop and a number of times I went there to take photos of guys who had been drafted and were leaving for the service.

There were three lunch counters: at Greene's Drug Store in Hotel Weaver, later Stephenson Hotel; Ken's Pharmacy, right next to Miller-Monroe offices, and Hested's, north of Memory Lane. Hested's was a semi-department store and the manager I recall was Bob Nelson, a WWII B-25 pilot. Their lunch counter also served meals, like a turkey dinner for \$1.

Ote Prater had a café in the 1800 lock on Stone about where Ink Addiction Tattoo is located. When he gave that up Blondena Foster (later Simon) managed the café. Ote also had a café where the Sikora Insurance and Real Estate office does business. Jo Moore and her husband came up from Hiawatha to take over the café. In mid-morning it was filled with coffee drinkers who might pass on a bit of gossip.

The Russet, a truly upscale restaurant owned and managed by Henry and Helen Hey was located where the Great China Café is situated. The Russet opened in WWII days and was destroyed by fire a year or so later and never rebuilt.

Another upscale restaurant was the Fireside Inn, the magnificent former home of the Fred Myers family. The Home Lumber Co. and several residences now occupy the location. It was first managed by Subby Lombardo and one of its favorite offerings was Subby's minestrone soup. Several managers followed Subby, including Junior Heineman and lastly, Mr./Mrs. Larry Curtis. Larry was retired Navy and they ran a super restaurant. Who will ever forget the house's elegant stairway? Fireside Inn was reduced to rubble by a devastating fire.

The Hotel Weaver's dining room was the No. 1 place for big dinner meetings, banquets, such as the FCHS Jr.-Sr. Prom. Mr./Mrs. Tony Schroedl were the hotel owners and about the time of the big oil play here, in the late 1930s and early 1940s, added the Coffee Shop, which also served meals. Later it became Hotel Stephenson with the same dining areas, plus the Sportsman's Lounge in the basement, operated for years by Ron and Rita Goll. The main dining room became The Wright Place under Jim Stephenson Jr.'s management.

Flanagan's Grill, with Russ Flanagan as owner, was the town's first fast food eatery. It was a small place with only six bar stools. His burgers-to-go went six for a buck. He had a real good business. Elsewhere there were Bertie's Grill, first between what is now Mid-Town Service and Sapps and then at the south end of the present Richardson County Bank & Trust. Marion Wise took it over and called it Fat Boy. Frosty Queen has been around a bunch of popular years and there was Wittrock's Drive-In where the Cummins Auction Service is located. Mutt and Jeffs got off to an early start with the Bob Appleoffs and Clarke Whittens and is a fixture in our community.

Next door to Mutt's, Lem's Northvue has had a good many precursors serving sandwiches, meals, etc. The first I can remember was H. A. Shier. He was know by his initials Has. Later, Bob "Squirrely" Alton was doing the cooking, Roman and Joe Fleskoski took over and so on. Gene Ewing ran Ewing's Café at 15th and Harlan. But it got its start as The Hexagon, owned by Reuben Metzger and it was a tavern with food. Hey's Pool Hall, where the Mini Park is located served sandwiches along with its pool tables and card tables which were usually busy. I don't believe a woman ever dared to enter. There was the Silver Grill, now the Bartek Chiropractic Service and Merz Law offices, which served the public during the early WWII years. Pete Frederick ran the Farmers Café in the livestock auction block now occupied by the Southeast Communications complex. Joe Gerweck's Wye Not Eat Cafe was west of Falter's Store and it later was Gene Dorste's Wagon Wheel. Harper's Café first was at 8th and Stone, the former location of Rhoades & Prater grocery store and later went to 10th Stone where it was followed by several cafes such as John Ramsey's and Tacketts. The Wissmans served excellent food at 7th and Harlan in what became known as The White House Cafe and then Southside Inn under Subby Lombardo and others.

I'm going to wind this up with other restaurant names: The Lil Duffer, Hardees and Burger King, King Arthur's Tea & Coffee Court, Dino's Mexican Café, Robidoux Cafe, Gus's Family Restaurant, Redwood Drive-In, Old Swiss, now Terri Jo's and the Dutch Windmill at 21st and Chase.

I sure must not overlook the Vets Club, now Veterinary Supply Co., which was big for a number of years when lots of veterans still existed. Pat McDermott was the impresario and a couple of bar/kitchen managers were Jim Prater, an ex-Marine who never knew a stranger, and a rather large import from Missouri whose name I can't recall. Anyway he was the guy, after dealing with Falls City bar patrons for several years came up with the gem, "Some years ago a circus train wrecked south of town and the clowns got off and stayed."

That about does it for me. I know I've missed a bunch but it's been fun trying to recall old eateries.

New USPS service hubs will hopefully hasten our paper's journey to your mailbox

Community newspapers using the mail received some good news recently when the U.S. Postal Service announced it expected to have 187 service hubs open by fall to provide direct transportation for newspaper mail in locations where mail processing plants have closed.

The announcement followed passage of a bill in a key Senate committee last week calling for a study of timely rural mail delivery. David E. Williams, chief operating officer of the Postal Service, credited the National Newspaper Association with working to establish the hubs. NNA requested study of the hub operation in testimony to the Postal Regulatory Commission in 2012, and has met with USPS continuously since then on the opening of the hubs as mail plants have closed.

A service hub permits publishers to prepare mail destined for nearby post offices in "Direct" containers that can be handed off directly at a hub to ride postal transportation to the destination post office, so that 5-digit, Carrier-Route — or mixed 5-digit containers combining both — can be dock-transferred between one post office and another in the Hub territory, usually that of the old Sectional Center Facility. The preparation of mail in 5-digit and carrier-route containers for hub handling avoids long and unnecessary trips to mail processing centers and helps publishers to reach subscribers more quickly. Publishers wanting to enter mail at the hub, possibly because the newspaper is printed nearby, can get the old SCF price for entering these containers there.

The establishment of hubs has become a pressing necessity for community newspapers that rely on the mail for circulation because nearly 100 mail processing centers have been shuttered by USPS in recent years and another 82 closings are planned. Williams said USPS had set up the hubs to help serve the customers of USPS and NNA newspapers.

"The Postal Service and the National Newspaper Association are committed to providing excellent service to customers. We are pleased to announce that 187 entry hubs have now been activated to maintain quality service for mailers, including newspapers serving rural customers. It has been our pleasure to work with the NNA, as keeping news and information and commerce moving in a timely fashion is an important mission for both of our organizations," Williams said.

NNA President John Edge-

combe Jr., thanked his predecessors, Merle Baranczyk, publisher of the Mountain-Mail in Salida, CO, and Robert M. Williams Jr., publisher of The Blackshear (GA) Times, for beginning NNA's initiative to seek hubs.

"This process has been gradually coming into shape since NNA first met with USPS in 2013," Edgecombe said. "Some of our members have been using the hubs while others have been waiting for their hubs to open. We think this development is going to help us improve service to readers who are in satellite towns that depend upon our publications and our markets. We appreciate the Postal Service's decision to establish them."

NNA Postal Committee Chair Max Heath said the complexity of the Postal Service requires patience and determination to achieve long-term projects.

"USPS is nearly a \$70 billion corporation with a half-million workers and more than 150 billion pieces of mail. It is not easy to make large changes like the plant realignment, nor to plug in the patches we asked for. Setting up hubs involved changing mailing lists, communicating with software providers, reprogramming USPS' core information structure PostalOne, and hundreds of other details. The hub solution seemed like a long time coming, but given the environment we are operating in and the tight financial condition of USPS, it is not surprising that it took a lot of patience and effort to get this new plan to come into being.

"I want to thank Postmaster General Megan Brennan and Mr. Williams for sticking with us through this process. I also want to thank Brad Hill, president of Interlink, and my colleague on the Mailers Technical Advisory Committee for his help in consulting with USPS on these hubs. They are going to make a difference, I believe. Newspapers should check the hub list and make sure via that office or their post office that dock transfers are occurring, and with software vendor to assure SCF prices being granted for direct containers dropped at hubs," Heath said.

AK-47 Bandit apparently strikes again

It is believed the same man who robbed a Nebraska City bank a year ago this month — labeled the "AK-47 Bandit" — has struck again, this time in Mason City, IA, according to the FBI.

At about 9:55 a.m. Tuesday, July 28, a lone white male suspect described as close to six feet tall, with a medium-to-stocky build, robbed the Heartland Community Credit Union in the northeastern Iowa city of about 28,000 people, located 35 miles from the Minnesota border.

The suspect was armed with an AK-47, took an undisclosed amount of money and left the area in a 2007-09 model black or dark-colored Toyota Camry LE. It is believed in past robberies he used a dark grey 2009-2011 Nissan Maxima with chrome door handles. He also left behind a suspicious item that was rendered safe by the authorities.

The suspect is considered armed and dangerous. A reward of up to \$100,000 is being offered in exchange for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the suspect who shot and wounded a Chino, CA, police officer after robbing a bank in 2012 and who has since been linked to four bank robberies and one attempt in multiple

Heat wave could solve potential problem of soybean aphids

Several years ago we had a late season infestation of soybean aphids and

some producers treated fields late in the growing season as soybean aphids reached economic threshold levels in southeast Nebraska. Recently soybean aphids have been found in low numbers in northeast Nebraska. If we have cooler temperatures, this is conducive to soybean aphid population increases, but the hot temps we've had recently should slow down or stop aphid reproduction. Aphids usually do not start populating in SE Nebraska until July.

To date I have not heard of any infestations in SE Nebraska, but I will plan to scout some fields this week. It is just important to scout fields to see if you have an infestation and then monitor the population. It is also important to observe the number of natural predators of aphids in your soybean fields, i.e. lady bugs and/or lacewings. Treating fields early for convenience if populations are not at threshold levels or just for convenience is a waste of time and money and you may kill natural predators of the soybean aphids and actually have to treat again.

If we have high temps (90 degrees or higher) into August, this will help to limit population increases. While I have not identified any soybean aphids yet in SE Nebraska, remember aphid populations can increase at extremely high levels under favorable conditions. Ideally soybean aphid population increases are fastest when temps are 70-80F. Populations can double in 2-3 days. If we have a period of cool weather conducive to soybean aphid growth and development in August, soybean aphids could reach economic

threshold levels. The economic threshold for treatment of soybean aphids is 250 aphids per plant average for a field (25 plants) with the population increasing. This is generally for soybeans through the R4 (full pod stage). With soybeans planted later this year, there may be more of a concern for later infestations to increase in population and cause economic damage if temperatures cool down as we move toward fall.

It is important to scout for soybean aphids on a weekly basis, especially when soybeans are flowering and begin setting pods. If you are in your soybean field, the recommendations for scouting are to randomly check 20-30 plants per field and determine the average aphids per plant for this field. If the level of aphids is 250 per plant, you have about seven days to schedule treatment. If you have a lot of natural pests in the field, such as lady beetles, green lacewings or see several aphid "mummies" treatment may not be necessary. Also if temps increase during this period, aphid populations may not increase. Check your field again to determine if populations are increasing and if treatment is necessary. There are several insecticides labeled for use on soybean aphids. Pyrethroids have a relatively long residual and work best at temperatures below 90F, while organophosphates have a heavy fuming action and may work well in heavy canopies or high temperatures.


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Pulitzer Prize-winning poet in Brownville Aug. 14

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How to save on school supplies

Back to school season can be as expensive for parents as it is exciting for students. 

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California and Klondike Gold Rushes!

Two of the world's most famous gold rushes were the "California gold rush" in the late 1840s and the "Klondike gold rush" in northwest Canada in the late 1890s. Three hundred thousand people traveled to "gold country," many by sea. To get to the Klondike region, people traveled through ice and snow. Only 30,000 of the 100,000 who tried to make the trip were able to finish it. Places for prospectors to gather and buy or sell supplies sprang up so quickly that they were called *boom towns*. Some of the boom towns of California became cities that still thrive today, but the boomtowns of the Klondike gold rush were short-lived, since gold was found in places that were easier and safer to reach.

Peru State, UNMC expand RHOP program

The University of Nebraska Medical Center and Peru State College have expanded their partnership in UNMC's Rural Health Opportunities Program to now include the clinical laboratory science, physical therapy, physician assistant and radiography educational programs.

Under the agreement, beginning this fall, qualifying Peru State students may apply for admission to RHOP and provisional acceptance into one of these respective UNMC College of Allied Health Professions educational programs.

PSC now has early admissions programs with four UNMC colleges, including RHOP agreements with UNMC's Colleges of Nursing, Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions, and the Public Health Early Admissions Student Track agreement with the UNMC College of Public Health.

The RHOP program began in 1990 to encourage rural residents to pursue careers in health care and practice in smaller communities throughout Nebraska. Chadron and Wayne State also participate with UNMC in RHOP and PHEAST.

"We are excited to further our RHOP partnership with Peru State," UNMC Chancellor Jeffrey P. Gold, M.D., said.

"This is an embodiment of our commitment to Nebraska, and a reflection on the need for a highly skilled allied health workforce. Through this agreement we not only offer opportunity to more students, but they in turn will help keep their fellow Nebraskans healthier and our rural communities strong."

"Peru State is proud to partner with the University of Nebraska Medical Center to bring more skilled health care providers to

rural Nebraska, meeting a critical need for the region," PSC President Dan Hanson said.

"RHOP represents a commitment by our institutions to investing in the health and well-being of southeast Nebraskans. I want to thank the leadership team at the UNMC College of Allied Health Professions, area hospital administrators and our science faculty for their work in securing these seats. Has your child had his/her shots?

Back-to-school season is here. It's time for parents to gather school supplies and back packs. It's also the perfect time to make sure your children are up to date on their vaccines.

"Getting children all of the vaccines recommended by CDC's immunization schedule is one of the most important things parents can do to ensure a healthy future for their child," said Chris Eltiste, Immunization Nurse.

"If you haven't done so already, now is the time to check with your doctor to find out what vaccines your child needs."

Vaccines protect against a number of serious and potentially life-threatening diseases. When children are not vaccinated, they are at increased risk for diseases and can also spread diseases to others in their classrooms and community – including babies who are too young to be fully vaccinated, and people with weakened immune systems due to cancer or other health conditions.

Vaccines are among the safest and most cost-effective ways to prevent disease. Protecting your children from preventable diseases will help keep them healthy and in school. When a child comes down with a disease such as whooping cough, chickenpox or the flu, he or she may miss a lot of school while recovering – and somebody will need to stay home to provide care and make trips to the doctor.

If you haven't already, check your child's immunization record and schedule a visit to their physician or clinic. Doing so now will avoid a potential last minute rush and will help make sure there are no surprises on the first day of school. Most schools require children to be up to date on vaccinations before enrolling or starting school in order to protect the health of all students. If you are unsure of your state's school immunization requirements, check with your child's doctor, school, child care provider, college health center, or the Southeast District Health Department.

Parents can check their student's immunization records and learn about required immunizations by visiting sedhd.org, calling 877-777-0424 or by contacting their healthcare provider.

The Southeast District Health Department offers immunization clinics for healthy adults and children who are uninsured and under-insured in Auburn, Falls City, Humboldt, Nebraska City, Pawnee City, Syracuse and Tecumseh.

Nebraska DOR decides to stick with four lanes on Harlan/73

A representative with the Nebraska Department of Roads Monday night at the regular meeting of the City Council said that public comments were about 50-to-1 against re-configuring Highway 73/Harlan St. into three lanes, so they aren't going to go ahead with the plan.

District 1 Engineer Thomas Goodbarn explained that what had been projected to be a \$2.9-million project will be scaled back dramatically with the decision and from 7th to 9th Streets on Harlan will now be patched, smoothed and then restriped. An overlay had been discussed, but that is not likely to happen now.

From 19th Street north, the highway project will be done as planned, with an asphalt overlay and the shoulders being repaired and guardrail either fixed or removed. All of the corners will meet Americans with Disabilities Act standards. By staying with the four-lane design the City will be responsible for upkeep of the outside two lanes of the highway with the State responsible for the inside lanes. Under the three-lane design the State would have been responsible for all of the upkeep.

Goodbarn said the Highway District does not want to force anything on the community that it is not comfortable with.
