With the cooperation of the weatherman, Chloe Louise Workman, a senior at HTRS High School, was crowned queen and Glenn O. PSC student accused of stabbing former teammate, two football players

A verbal altercation among Peru State College athletes turned bloody Saturday night, as two Bobcat football players and a member of the basketball team were allegedly stabbed by a former PSC basketball player.

The Nebraska State Patrol, in conjunction with the Nemaha County Sheriff's Office Monday morning took 24-year-old Jeffland R. Neverson into custody without incident in connection with the stabbings of Bobcat football players Elijah Lavalais-Hawkins, 20, and Larry Hodnett, 19, as well as 23-year-old Anthony Hemingway, a high school basketball teammate of Neverson's in Brooklyn, N.Y., and a Junior College All-American at Monroe (NY) Community College last year.

All three were hospitalized with non-life-threatening injuries. Lavalais-Hawkins, a junior linebacker from Omaha, and Hodnett, a freshman running back from Georgia who started and performed well in all of the Bobcats' first four games of 2016, were then flown to Bryan Trauma Center in Lincoln for treatment of more serious injuries.

Authorities responded to the disturbance outside an off-campus party at around 10:15 p.m. Saturday. The case remains under investigation.

Neverson left the basketball team last semester, but remains a PSC student. He is being held in the Nemaha County Courthouse in Auburn on charges of first degree assault and use of a weapon to commit a felony.

He was arrested at a residence in Peru before noon Monday.

911 updates for Sheriff's Office

Richardson County Sheriff Don Pounds met Tuesday, Sept. 13, with Commissioners Dave Sichel, Jim Davidson and Jim Standerford and requested that the County contact the City of Falls City for data needed for 911 services.

The data will be implemented into the County's new dispatching software by the Sheriff's Office and is necessary for both the City and County systems to function efficiently.

Sheriff Pounds also reported on staffing at the new Richardson County Jail. He said applications continued to be accepted for jailer positions. Later in the meeting, Sheriff Pounds' collected fee report (\$2,574.18) for July, 2016, was accepted.

National Farm Safety Week

This week of September 18 through September 24 is National Farm Safety Week. Each year in Nebraska and other states there have been tragic farm accidents. It reminds us of the importance of farm safety and how dangerous farming can be. Statistics indicate that in 2014 there were 568 fatalities in the agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting category, compared to 500 in 2013, a 13.6 percent increase. With fall harvest just beginning, safety needs to be an important focus for farmers and others in our rural community. Agriculture is one of the most dangerous industries in the United States. Approximately 100 children and youth die in farm work accidents annually in the United States. In the spring of 2010 there were five farm fatalities in Nebraska in a matter of a few weeks. It is extremely important to be aware of farm hazards to prevent potential farm accidents and even fatalities on the farm. There is potential for a wet fall which can slow down harvest and may make it more dangerous with more stress and poorer harvest conditions.

Corn grain harvest will start in earnest soon, with soybean harvest following here in southeast Nebraska. It is very important for all of us to remember safety during this busy time of the year. It is important for

farmers and travelers alike to be aware of the dangers of harvest equipment being transported on the highways and country roads.

The days are getting shorter, so sometimes it is very difficult to see, especially around dusk or dawn when the sun sometimes blinds you as you drive toward it. Country roads can be dusty, making driving particularly hazardous when harvest equipment is moving from field to field. While these conditions call for cautious driving for the traveler, farmers need to have the proper SMV (Slow Moving Vehicle) signs on their equipment. It is also important that farm tractors and combines have functioning hazard-warning lights. Operating headlights and hazard-warning lights provide advance warning for other drivers on highways and country roads.

Safety at the farmstead and in the field must not be overlooked either. Equipment, tractor, and truck operators must always be aware of other people in the area, particularly young children and elderly people. When entering the farmyard, especially at night, be alert to pedestrians. If you are starting up and will be moving equipment, check to make sure everything is clear and

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Corrections reform continues

Over the past few years, you've read a lot about the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services (NDCS). From sentencing miscalculations to population issues to staffing challenges, the agency has faced numerous hurdles.



Since taking office a year and a half ago, my administration has prioritized Corrections reform because the work of the agency is key to protecting public safety. A national search in partnership with the Omaha Chamber of Commerce helped us recruit Scott Frakes, who has been leading reform efforts over the past 18 months. Together, we have been working to automate prison sentencing calculations, successfully advocated for expanding existing facilities, and produced culture and staffing studies which are informing additional initiatives.

Building and retaining a quality team is key to making the agency's reform efforts successful. Every week, over 2000 hardworking men and women at Corrections labor tirelessly to protect public safety. They work in an environment that is often dangerous, unpredictable, and exhausting. The recent rise in inmate violence against staff has only compounded the complexity of their work.

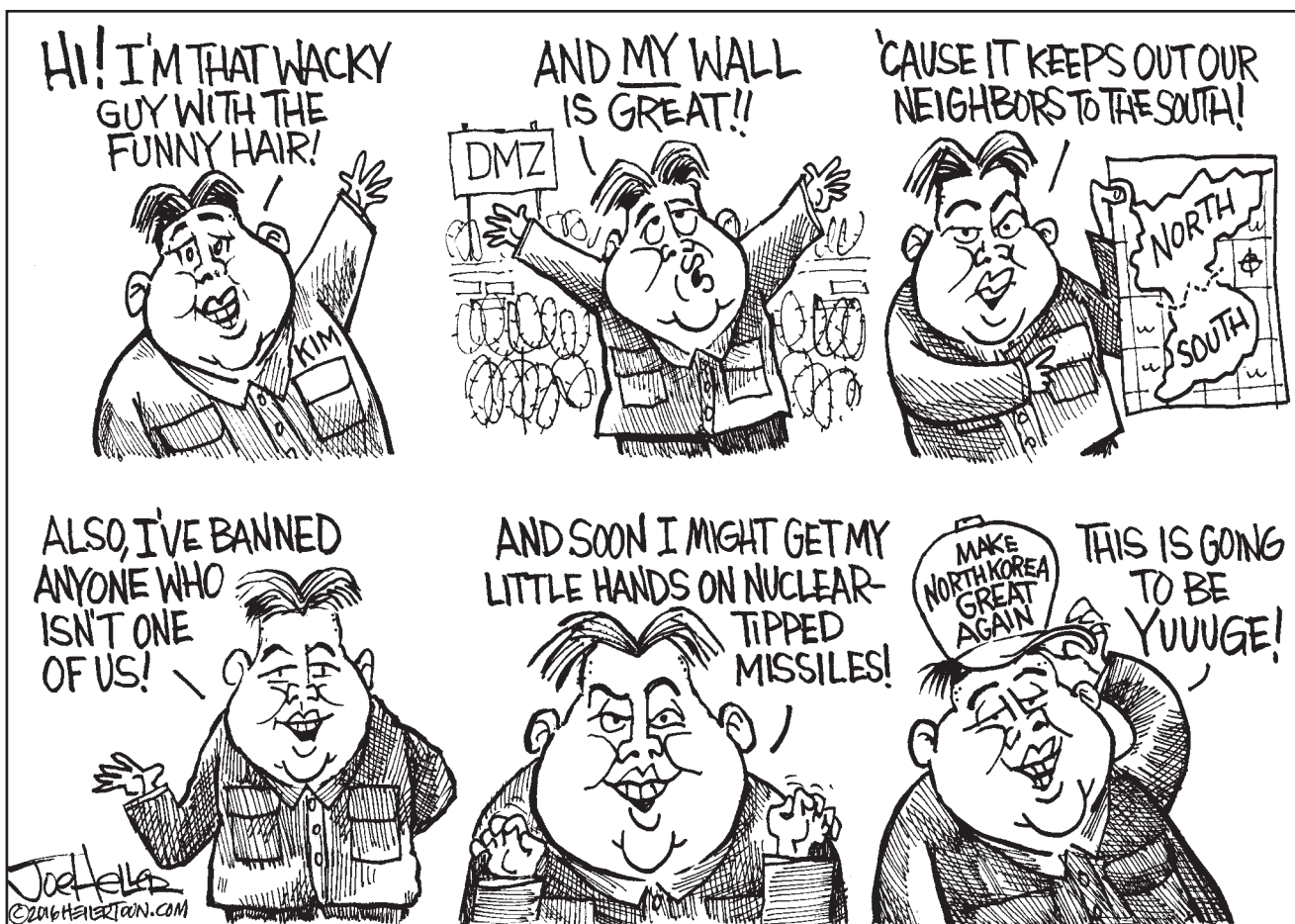
Two weeks ago, I met with some of our team members who had recently been assaulted by inmates to hear directly from them about how we can improve the culture of Corrections. From an officer in their first year to a third generation NDCS team member, they represented a broad range of our workforce. They spoke honestly about the challenges they face every day. Our Corrections professionals care about staff security. They see many of their coworkers leaving. They want upper management to listen to their concerns and feedback. They want to support commonsense reforms in our Corrections system.

Our staff's wellbeing is an immediate concern, and we have taken actions to improve security. Earlier this summer, Director Frakes ordered a system wide audit of Corrections facilities to identify security concerns, and steps are being taken to address weaknesses. Corrections is also taking proactive steps to prevent inmate assaults. This last week, Corrections locked down the prison in Tecumseh after intelligence showed inmates planning to cause harm to our employees. Additionally, I have asked Director Frakes and his leadership team to look at how the agency manages inmates who harm staff. We do not tolerate violence against our Corrections officers.

Retaining a workforce committed to the mission of Corrections, like the team members I met with, is a top priority as we push forward with reform in the agency. That's why last week my administration delivered a bona fide offer on wages for Corrections to the state employee union a month early. Right now, pay for several classes of Corrections employees lags. This proposal includes raises that are up to four and a half times the raises in the last contract for our most critical Corrections personnel. It is a significant investment in our Corrections workforce, and a serious step towards addressing staffing and retention.

Compensation and security are just two pieces of the puzzle. During a recent meeting with Corrections leadership, I urged management to look for additional ways to listen to their team members on a regular basis. Director Frakes has been working to integrate feedback from his team members. That's why he asked for the culture study that he released earlier this year. The study has served as the basis for several initiatives he is launching, including conducting the security audit mentioned above, looking at alternative shifts with an emphasis on improving quality of life, and piloting the creation of a new shift sergeant position to help better manage frontline staff. While the culture study was a great first step in listening, the agency is working on ways to build a culture where feedback is welcome and integrated.

As Corrections reform continues, it's important not to lose sight of the progress that has been made. The challenges at Corrections weren't created overnight, and cultural change in the agency won't happen overnight either. Director Frakes and I are committed to reform, and we value the support of the numerous partners, including the Legislature and LR34 Committee, who have worked hard to prioritize reform. Death and taxes, perennial issue draws attention

"In this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes."

History records that Benjamin Franklin said it. History has also proven it true.

Governor Pete Ricketts has promised he'll keep the issue of property tax relief on the front burner, again.

A couple of policy think tanks, the state Chamber of Commerce, and a senator or two have also weighed into the preliminary discussions. Most lean toward total tax reform beyond just property taxes.

Tiffany Joekel, policy director for the non-partisan Open Sky Policy Institute, says property tax is the go-to revenue source for local services. Sales tax and income tax, in that order, are next. With Nebraska facing an immediate budget shortfall of \$100 million and perhaps more than \$350 million at the end of the following budget year, tough decisions must be made, she said. Diversified revenue sources would likely be more stable.

The simple fact remains, Nebraska is a high-tax state, says Barry Kennedy of the Nebraska Chamber. A prominent financial website -- WalletHub.com -- has named Illinois and Nebraska as the worst states for combined state-and-local tax burden. Kennedy said high taxes repel job growth and investment.

While property taxes receive much attention, income and sales taxes, combined, pose a much larger financial burden for the average Nebraskan, he said. In 2015, income and sales taxes accounted for \$4.13 billion collected while \$3.78 billion came from property taxes. The state's top income tax rate of 7 percent hurts families and employers who are trying to recruit skilled labor and grow the economy and the population.

Kennedy cautioned that tax shifts are not tax relief. A shift from property taxes to sales and income taxes lessens local accountability. More than two-thirds of all property taxes collected in Nebraska last year were from residential or business properties. The state's property tax credit program gave commercial and industrial taxpayers fewer than 14 percent of the credits, while residential owners received 35 percent and agriculture received 47 percent.

Another policy think tank, the Platte Institute, said that tax reform should reduce top-line corporate and individual income tax rates while broadening the sales tax base and reducing corporate tax credits. State Senator Jim Smith of Papillion is expected to offer a comprehensive legislative proposal to his colleague that might reflect some thoughts of the Platte Institute. Smith said Nebraska does have

a tax issue and is in need of tax reform to create jobs and provide growth. Over time, such moves would increase revenue, he said.

Speaker of the Legislature Galen Hadley of Kearney said that annual tax cuts have already reduced revenue by \$750 million over 10 years. Senator Paul Schumacher of Columbus said an obsession with taxes often blinds lawmakers to opportunities and challenges. It's unclear how

those attitudes will play into next year's debate.

And, of course, Ricketts will find a senator to introduce the administration's expected tax plan.

Given that the Appropriations and Revenue Committees will have new leadership and some new faces will also factor into the debate.

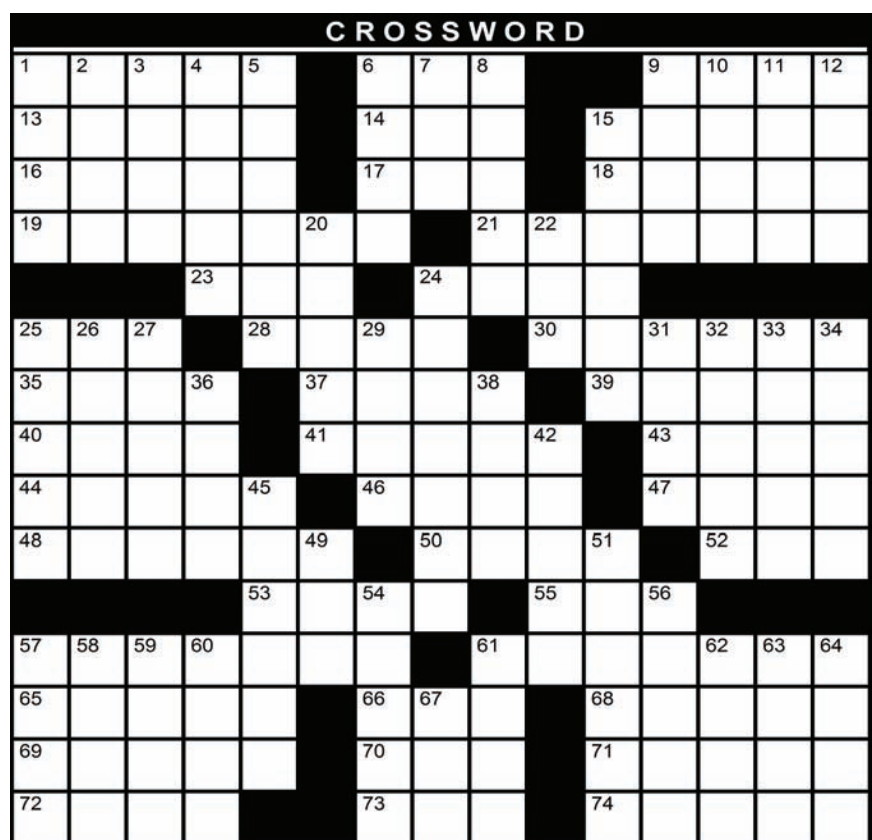
Joekel said it's important that lawmakers avoid decisions that create new problems. Just take a look at neighboring Kansas where dramatic cuts in state income taxes created a myriad of problems.

Car Seat checks at Falls City North School on Wednesday

Area parents and caregivers will have an opportunity to have child safety seats checked as part of a safety event at the West side of North School in Falls City on Wednesday, September 21 between 2:30 p.m. and 6:30 pm. Nationally-certified child passenger safety technicians from Southeast Safety for Kids and Community Medical Center will be present to provide assistance.

"Our technicians will be on the west side of North School," says Laura Osborne, Safe Kids Southeast Coordinator. "We will assist parents, grandparents and other caregivers in securing passengers age 12 and under correctly in motor vehicles.

"We are looking forward to helping as many families as we can that evening," Osborne says. "It is our goal that children leave our event safer than they arrive. The misuse rates we have seen over 13 years of work in this field have been about 85% of all car seats we check. When our technicians work with a family, they are working to empower the parent and/or caregiver to install the child safety seat correctly themselves. This is important as we strive to keep the youngest citizens of southeast Nebraska as safe as possible while traveling in motor vehicles."

North School is located at 2500 Stone Street in Falls City. Anyone who transports children are encouraged to attend. Questions can be addressed to Lisa Schawang or Marcia Harmon at Community Medical Center.

It's been an exciting first couple of weeks for the HTRS FFA chapter. The chapter is going to have a float representing their team in the Richardson County Fair Parade this month. They will be decorating it to fit the theme of the county fair. The group will also be having a booth down at the fair where they will be selling beef sticks. The beef sticks will be available for \$1 each.

The HTRS chapter also took a group of kids out to the state fair in Grand Island for a Dairy com-

petition. The senior team was Logan Bredemeier, Trenton Plager, Logan Standerford, and Camille Svoboda. Lauren Patzel was the alternate. The senior team had to give a presentation to judges, take a test, judge six classes of dairy cows and heifers, and give reasons on three of those classes. Every member placed in the top 30 out of 61 competitors. there isn't anyone playing or looking around the equipment. Many times young children may be playing in and around equipment and are difficult to see. Sometimes people may be looking at equipment and they do not hear it being started up and may end up in the way and at risk of getting injured. The most common accidents that occur in handling grain involve suffocation, falls, entanglement, and electrocution. Always protect yourself, use caution, and practice safety first!

Finally safety in the field must not be overlooked. While you may be very careful when you're on

the road or at the farmstead when other people are involved, don't forget safety in the field. During harvest there is pressure to get the crop harvested as soon as possible. We must not ignore safety when we're harvesting the crop. Always be sure to follow all safety guidelines listed in the manufacturer's operator manual and always have shields in place, and support equipment properly when working under it. Never try to unplug a combine when it is running. There have been too many people that have lost a limb or have died trying to do this. The bottom line is "JUST BE CAREFUL!"

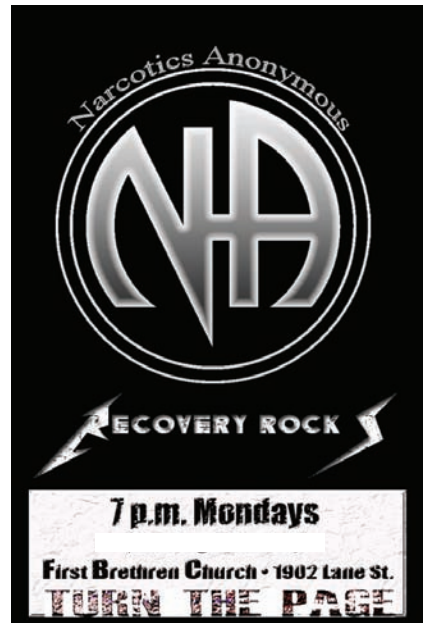

On Friday afternoon the Falls City Tigers traveled to Lincoln to take on the Crusaders from Lincoln Christian. The Tigers came into the game fresh off a big home win against Fairbury, while the Crusaders came into the game looking for their first victory of the young season.

The game started off great for the Tigers as they held LC to just 13 yards on four plays and forced a Crusader punt. FC took over on their own 34 yard line, but four plays later they turned the ball over on an interception. Four plays and 38 yards later LC scored the games' first touchdown. Treyson Bigler completed a 43 yard pass to Reid Houchin for the score. The PAT run failed and with 8:11 to go in the first quarter LC led 6-0.

On their next possession FC moved the ball 32 yards down the field on seven plays but turned the ball over on downs on the Crusader 15 yard line. Lincoln was able to put together a nice drive against the Tiger defense but after a 51 yard drive the Tigers got an interception and had the ball on their own 14 yard line. Once again the offense moved the ball well picking up 71 yards over eight plays. However the drive came to an end again on the opponents 15 yard line after yet another interception.

The Tiger defense again did their job as they force LC into a three and

out. After the punt FC had the ball first and ten from the opponents 44 yard line. This time the Tigers moved the ball all the way down to the Crusaders five yard line before a fumble once again cost them a scoring opportunity. The Tigers were in the Red Zone three times in the first half but came away with zero points. LC led by a score of 6-0.

FC got the ball to start the second half and took the kickoff out to their 31 yard line. The Tigers methodically moved the ball down the field and this time they would not be denied, going 69 yards on 14 plays for their first score of the game. Ed Fritz carried the ball for the two yard touchdown. The PAT kick by Dalton Kennel was no good and with 5:21 to go in the third quarter the game was tied 6-6.

LC wasted very little time getting back on top. On just the second play of the drive Bigler completed a pass to Alex Schreiner for an 82 yard touchdown. The two point attempt was good and LC took a 14-6 lead with 4:54 remaining in the third quarter.

The Tigers lost the ball on the kickoff and the Crusader again had the ball, this time on the FC 34 yard line. The defense stepped it up and forced a turnover on downs at their own 14 yard line. FC again moved the ball well out to the opponents 43 yard line before yet another turnover, this time a fumble, cost them a chance. On the very next play the Tigers fortune turned and this time they fell on a fumble. After moving the ball down to the seven yard line the turnover bug hit again, yet another interception.

The Tiger defense, trying to do everything they could to turn the game around came up big and forced a punt after giving up negative three yards on three plays. After a short punt the Tigers had the ball first and ten from the Crusaders 29 yard line with 6:48 to go in the game. Five plays and 29 yards later Zayne Heckenlively carried the ball

eight yards for the touchdown. The two point attempt carry by Heckenlively was also good and with 4:42 to go in the game the score was all tied up at 14-14.

The cheers didn't last long though as Lincoln Christian went 67 yards on two plays for what would prove to be the winning score. It was once again a Bigler to Schreiner pass, this time for 70 yards. The PAT kick was no good, but the Tigers now trailed 20-14.

The Tigers still had time but turned the ball over on downs after a nine play 48 yard drive. The defense did their job though and forced a punt with 22 seconds remaining. FC had one more chance but an interception by the Crusader defense gave Lincoln Christian their first win off the year and dropped the Tigers to 2-2.

FC out gained LC 369 to one on the ground, but were out gained 352 to 44 through the air. "Defensively we played alright, but tackling was an issue again," said Coach Fritz. Turnovers killed the Tigers this week as did lack of scoring once they were in the red zone. When asked about the problems Friday night Coach Fritz responded, "we'll its time to get back to the basics, when a team turns the ball over eight times it is hard to win any game. We just have to get a lot better in that area."

Heckenlively again led the ground attack for the Tigers with 229 yards on 29 touches. Fritz had a strong game also putting up 85 yards on 12 carries.

The Tigers (2-2) will be back at home this week to take on the Auburn Bulldogs (1-3) for homecoming. "Auburn is executing at a pretty high level right now. They have really good speed at the skill positions. We need to be sound defensively and take care of the ball on offense," said Fritz.

He served as Chairman of the AAL Branch 1773, Immanuel Lutheran Layman's League and Immanuel Couples Club. He also served as Chairman of the Columbus Area Retired Teachers Association and was a member of AARP. In addition, Mr. Eickhoff was a member of the VFW, American Legion, and the Military Officers of America.

He is survived by four children: Bruce (Tina) Eickhoff of Springfield, VA; Ralph Jr. (Jane) Eickhoff of Delapane, VA; JoAnn (Patrick) Shemek of Parrish, FL; and Larry (Jeannie) Eickhoff of Yorktown, VA; six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

On the first offensive snap of the game for the Patriots Michael Keithley broke through the line for a sack and a loss of 14 yards. The defense held and forced a three and out to begin the game. After a short punt the Irish had the ball first and ten from the Patriots 38 yard line. Three plays later Drew Bippes took the snap and rolled out to his right and floated a pass down the middle to Austin Ahern for a 26 yard touchdown. The conversion attempt was incomplete and with 8:57 to play in the first quarter the Irish led 6-0.

Once again the Irish defense stepped up and forced another three and out. Sean Arnold took the punt back 19 yards to the Patriot 15 yard line. Two plays later Bippes again rolled right and threw back across the field to his left to Emerson Keithley for a 12 yard touchdown pass. An Ahern run for the two point try made the score 14-0 S.H. with 6:28 to play in quarter number one.

On third and 10 from their own 15 yard line the Patriots tried a reverse. Theo Roher made a hit and caused a fumble and Brandon Scheitel pounced on the ball on the Parkview 13 yard line. The Irish wasted little time. On first down, with three receivers wide left, Bippes hit Christian Harring who made two defenders miss and walked into the endzone untouched. The extra point kick failed and with 5:27 to go the Irish led 20-0.

Parkview couldn't get anything going on offense against the Irish. On third and seven, the Patriots tried a sweep left that was met by Michael Keithley for another tackle for loss. After another punt the Irish took over on their own 36 yard line. After a nice 21 yard screen pass to Ahern down the middle of the field the Irish made a rare mistake. On first down Bippes fumbled the ball and the Patriots jumped on it with 2:01 left in the first quarter. A couple of plays later Tristan Keithley intercepted the ball and returned it 12 yards to the PVC 26 yard line. It

was the Patriot defense that would stand strong this time as the Irish turned the ball over on downs.

On the next play the Patriots completed a pass over the heads of two Irish defenders for a 56 yard touchdown. The PAT failed and with :41 left the score was 20-6. After a nice kick return by Arnold the Irish once again moved the ball down field 40 yards on five plays, capped off by a nice run by Arnold down the right side of the field for a 12 yard touchdown. The two point carry by Arnold was also good. With 10:44 remaining in the second quarter S.H. led 28-6.

After another three and out the Irish got the ball back and went 33 yards on two plays for the score. Bippes hit Arnold down the left sideline for the touchdown. The kick was good and the Irish led 35-6 with 8:22 left in the half. The scores kept coming as the Irish were back on the board again with 5:55 to go after a 38 yard quick screen pass from Bippes to Harring. The kick failed and the score was 41-6.

After the sixth three-and-out of the half the Irish got the ball back. Once again the arm of Bippes was hot as he completed a 34 yard touchdown pass to Arnold on the first play of the drive. The kick was good and the score was 48-6 with 3:38 left. Not to sound redundant but the defense came up big again and forced a punt after just three plays. After a penalty S.H. had it on their own five yard line. On the first play Harring ran the ball 75 yards down the field for the touchdown. The score was 54-6 heading into halftime.

That was it for the starters for the night. Not to be outdone the Irish reserves moved the ball 73 yards on 19 plays down the field. Joe Bieker capped off the drive with a 6 yard run for the score. The extra point attempt failed, but the Irish had a commanding 60-6 lead. That would prove to be all the scoring for the Irish on the night. Parkview added a couple late scores against

the young Irish defenders but the Irish came out with a convincing 60-18 victory.

Bippes ended up 8-11 passing for 170 yards and 6 touchdown passes. When asked about his quarterback Goltz replied, "I'm not sure if I recall a player throwing for that many in one game since I've been coaching. Some was due to good throws and some was due to good runs after the catch and blocking."

Harring only had four carries but ran for 85 yards. Bieker looked strong the second half going for 63 yards on 11 touches. While the Irish had some big carries, Coach Goltz said "we still are not run blocking as we need to. We need to get better at that."

The Irish will travel to Mead this weekend. "Mead will be a challenge. They have good size and good athletes. (D-2 State Basketball runner-ups last year)" said Goltz.





2.4d Policy Planning: The following policies are up for first reading upon review:
1) 7115 Student Conduct: As noted in the discussion relating LB 710 amended the criminal definition of hazing so that it applies to all Nebraskans, including K-12 students. Previously, only students attending postsecondary institutions were subject to criminal penalties for hazing. This change is significant for purposes of student discipline policies and handbook provisions. As a result, we are amending our student discipline policy's Administrative Regulation. This policy will now be consistent with Policy #7146 Initiations and Hazing.
2) 9110 Special Education Procedures: Representatives of the Nebraska Department of Education's Office of Special Education have shared with us that the federal agencies they work with seem to be increasing the number and complexity of special education policies that they require states, which in turn is passed on to local agencies. The updated special education procedures reflect the most recent federal and state updates.
Policies to review that will be up on second and final reading are as follows:
1) 7144 Initiations and Hazing: LB 710 changed the criminal definition of "hazing" so that it now applies to K-12 students. LB 710 also changed the list of activities which constitute "hazing" in Nebraska. This policy also clarifies the difference between initiations and hazing. The district's legal counsel includes "initiations" because hazing occurs only if the activity poses a threat to the physical or mental health of the student. Legal counsel believes some rituals may not rise to that criminal level but may still constitute an activity a school wants to or is required to prohibit. For that reason, the policy outlaws hazing as defined in LB 710, but also makes clear that initiations are also prohibited unless expressly authorized by the superintendent.
2) 7145 Self-Management of Diabetes or Asthma/Anaphylaxis: In LB 1086 the Unicameral amended the statute that governs student self-management of asthma and severe allergies that could lead to anaphylaxis. The law now states that one of the criteria to require a school to allow a student with asthma/anaphylaxis to self-manage is the authorization of a physician "or other health care professional who prescribed the medication for the treatment of the student's condition." The Unicameral only amended the statute relating asthma/anaphylaxis. Therefore, we will continue to require the authorization of a medical doctor prior to allowing students to self-manage diabetes.

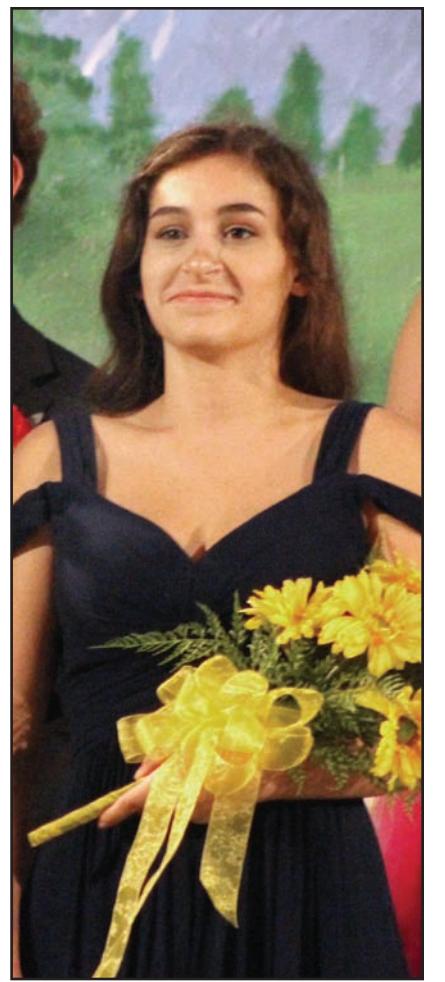
Glenn is a member of the Faith Lutheran Church, which he has served as an elder and treasurer and Sunday school teacher.
